#### PRESIDENT'S COLUMN

One of the hardest things for an engineer to do is admit they made a mistake in a calculation. Hey, it happens to the best of us. Remember those rocket scientists who mistakenly mixed up units between miles and kilometers and Mars Climate Orbiter met with the Martian surface at a rather high velocity? Well my mistake was not quite so expensive. I can blame it on bad input data rather than a calculation error. The bottom line is our trip Deb and I are planning to Summit 2008 in Mont Tremblant will cost an additional \$30 more in gas than it would have last year, not my first estimation of \$60.

Anyone of you who have personal experiences with engineers knows we are a lot who are "Careful How Expenses Are Paid" or in other words "CHEAP" so I decided to look into this new technology of Hypermilage. The top three items in good normal car maintenance are:

**Properly inflated tires** – This item however seems to creep into the third category when taken to extremes like people inflating their tires past the max pressure rating on the tire.

Clean air filters - The original equipment air filters on my car don't trap anything smaller than a June bug so restricted airflow should not be a problem.


