From the President:

I do not know what the weather has been in you neck of New England but here in the 14th state of the Union it has been terrific the entire month . . . for evaluating the foul weather gear on your Healey that is. I think with this July weather our region should be reclassified as a temperate rain forest. I'm not saying we have had a lot of rain but there is a guy down the street with a big white beard building this huge boat and a bunch of animals are queuing up in pairs.

I discovered early on that it takes a crew of two to drive a Healey in the rain if you want to be somewhat safe, responsible, and courteous to everyone else on the road. You need a driver of course and a Moisture Sopper Upper armed with a small towel to continuously clean the inside of the windscreen and a larger towel to catch the small river pouring in by the base of the windscreen post that is soaking your outboard knee and floating the floor mats. Experienced long distance rain crews even have a plastic gallon size ziplock bag to wring out the small towel into when it reaches saturation point. This is the type of information Donald forgot to have the factory include in the owners manual. At least it isn't in mine.

I guess I could take the time to chase down most of the leak sources but it is a lot like a leaky roof. I only think about it when the water is running down my left leg and filling my sneaker while I am trying to find that balance between a slow enough safe driving speed and one fast enough to get the Rain-X on the windscreen to work properly. I am impressed that my windscreen wipers do actually work providing a visibility patch about the size of a decent piece of Thanksgiving pumpkin pie.

To top everything off we have a roadster with that erector set hood and side curtains so you either plan well ahead or just keep driving. The latter works pretty good for me most of the time but I would have hated to be caught in several of the monsoons we have had this past month. A well trained crew of two can get the hood and side curtains in place in 10 minutes flat! You can do better in the sunshine but who puts the hood up then?
