#### **AHCA NE January 2012 President's letter**

We have turned the page, starting another promising Healey year. This mild winter has been great for NE Healey owners in the southern states, with occasional runs on the sunny dry days, without any salt and sand on the road. I always try and keep the Healey's exercised in the winter, whenever possible. It is always a good idea to keep the batteries charged with any inexpensive trickle charger, such as a Battery Tender.

2012 is looking like a great year, with 20 already planned AHCA NE events, or meets in conjunction with other British car clubs. We are listening to your recommendations, from the survey results, and suggestions to our Area Coordinators and Officers. Our first 2012 Planning meeting January 14<sup>th</sup> had great attendance from members from around the region, and the minutes are printed in this month's Healey Exhaust Notes Newsletter. We have the largest array of AHCA NE one day events this year; including Tech Sessions, Driving tours, the Collings Foundation automotive and aviation museum, "Healey's on the Green" at Mystic Seaport, accompanying the antique boat show, as well as regional events starting a members' homes. These exciting one day events are in addition to "Healey's on the Summit" 2012, mid-July in North Conway, NH including a drive up to the Summit of Mt. Washington. On a clear day, the view will be breathtaking from the Summit!

AHCA NE will have representation and organization at many British car events this year including Carlisle Imports weekend, British by the Sea, Tanglewood British Festival, British Car Day at Lars Anderson Museum, Hemmings Sports & Exotics – Saratoga, NY, Lime Rock Historic Festival featuring Sterling Moss, and British Invasion. If you are aware of other interesting Healey and British car events planned for 2012 please contact me or any of the Officers or Area Coordinators with your ideas. I am hearing a lot more from members around the region looking to buy or sell cars for the upcoming driving season. Please remember to use club advertisers when you need advice or work completed on your Healey.

Thank you to all the members who update you Healey ownership details including chassis number and year of manufacturer. Our club member data base currently has over 350 cars and I have summarized the ownership by Model. We have details on 47 100's including, 12 100M's and the earliest model accounts for 13% of the Healey's, in our region. 29 100-6's have survived in New England, with just slightly more BN4's, compared to the two seat BN6. BT7's account for 10% of the Healey's in NE, and we only are aware of 10 their two seat brothers, BN7. The first convertible Big Healey's the BJ7, account for 7% of the models in the region, with 24 cars. BJ8's are far and away the most popular Healey in NE, with 149 examples and 41% of all Healey's. The BJ8 survival rate is more than double any of the other Big Healey models in here.

Sprites make up 18% of all Healey's in the region with the Mark 1 (Bugeye) the most popular accounting for 84% of known Sprites, still on the road. The survival rate on Sprites is also much lower than Big Healey's by a factor of 4 times compared to their Big brother. We know of two examples in our club, of the rarest Sprite, the Italian made, Innocenti.

On January 21<sup>st,</sup> our New England club, we will be donating to Jay Leno at his Big Dog Garage in Burbank, CA, the freshly restored Dunlop Tire Bridge, originally created for Conclave 2007 in Burlington, VT. The Dunlop Tire will be permanently displayed at Leno's Garage for others to enjoy in a new setting We will provide complete coverage in next month newsletter of the presentation to Jay Leno, plus articles in the Healey Marque, Boston Globe, and other classic car magazines. Jay will have a film crew on site, for a production of the presentation, to be included on his Big Dog Garage website. <a href="https://www.jaylenosgarage.com">www.jaylenosgarage.com</a>

#### **VALVE COVER RACER GUIDELINES:**

Racers can be up to 26" long and up to 18" wide.

Maximum weight is 12 lbs.

All wheels must be 6" or less in diameter, <u>and must have a non-metallic outer surface that</u> contacts the track.

Wheels cannot extend beyond the front or rear of the valve cover.

No mechanical propulsion is allowed.

All racers must be "home-made" No catalogue racers allowed.

There will be prizes for the fastest cars, best design, and a special event for kids. In our group kids are anyone under 40! We look forward to lots of entrants. I promise it will be a lot of fun!

#### Our BN1- Year One

On a cold and windy December 02, 2010 we test drove a 1955 Austin Healey 100 BN1 and made an offer to buy it. Sixteen days later BN1L 221354 arrived at our home. This is the story of the first year with our BN1. This is the eighth big Healey I have owned.

Among the prior seven big Healeys only one was a 100-4 and was a non-running project car that I sold before I got to do anything with it. The test drive on December 02 and moving this BN1 into our garage on December 18<sup>th</sup> were my only experiences from the driver's seat of a Healey 100. Since Christmas was only seven days away, not to mention working, the BN1 was the center of much admiration but no activity. In the Hudson Valley we received our first snow storm on December 26. The



Healey did not see sunshine again until the end of April, 2011. And since it had been licensed and a fully operational vehicle, the four month winter delay until I would drive it again was a torture. I was most anxious to put the windshield down to "speed position", my term, and experience that vintage hero-driver rush.

BN1L 221354 had been mildly vintage raced four times by a prior owner. I received the VSCCA log book. Still installed were its roll bar, ignition kill switch, fire extinguisher, Simpson 5-point harness and Brooklins racing windshield. The lady I purchased the BN1 from intended to also vintage race it and upgraded the rear axle to a BN2, had a rebuild of the carbs and ignition and thorough cooling system service. All of which added to my hero-driver anxiety. All I needed was the usual NYS registration, inspection, insurance and snow free roads.

In no way did the Healey sit dormant awaiting the warm weather. It had been restored in early 1970s displaying a wealth of patina and the signs of wear and tear like a favorite bomber jacket. All things chrome and upholstered welcomed a cleaning and polishing. The excitement of a child with a new toy drove me to play and investigate all its mechanical features. The only panic drill came about from checking the ammeter and battery charge gauges that had been added prior. My fiddling had apparently shifted the ammeter dash mounting bracket and shorting against the hot lead that came from the starter motor. Upon turning on the ignition switch I was immediately horrified by the smell of burning wires and smoke rising from the engine compartment. YIKES! The melting of the newish wiring harness flashed thru my mind with atomic speed. Fortunately I was standing next to the kill switch and had the lightning quick reflexes to use it. The only harm was to a short section of wire added to power the gear reduction starter. After that, my tinkering for the next four months was noneventful and all fun. Thankfully.

Another thrill from buying the BN1 was that I could finally use some of the parts I had acquired when I worked in 1971-72 at a Jaguar & MG dealer that had been an Austin Healey dealer. The BN1 received NOS parts for its gear shift knob, both right hand knock-offs and shift lever to trans fork bushing. I spend many hours reading the original shop repair manual and spare parts catalog while sitting by the fireplace.

When the last snow had disappeared, the roads were clear and I was ready to drive the Healey to get its NYS inspection. Although it was late April and the convertible top would not fit over the roll bar I was too excited to notice the chilly early morning spring air. The repair shop is about six miles over an open, winding, two lane road and I soaked in every minute and mile of pure vintage Healey Hundred motoring. I envisioned a summer full of Healey inspired drives and adventures.

The first outing was to the Rhinebeck, NY Classic Car Show which has been on the first weekend of May for over thirty years. Two friends in their Lotus Elans made up our sports car caravan of three. I had the windshield lower to the speed position, a tonneau cover in place and I wore WWI flying goggles. I feel the Healey image was completed by the absence of bumpers and a pair of Lucas Flame Thrower driving lights in front. The drive was a total thrill and exhilarating adventure for me. The lowered windshield is a real attention getter, particularly with children. There were six other big Healeys at the show to represent the marque.

My wife has always enjoyed my Healeys and we dated in BN4, which is also an interesting saga. We enjoyed many local drives in the BN1. Unfortunately we were not able to take the Healey to the Summit at Mystic Seaport because the main relay was flaky and rendered the overdrive inoperative. I'd have to say that may have been fortunate because we had forgotten how (very) hot a big Healey interior can be in the summer. We did attend the Summit by way of our VW Jetta Turbo and enjoyed meeting members of the NE AHCA. Seeing so many beautiful Healeys was an awesome treat.

A prior owner of our BN1 from 1975 to April, 2010 lives in Cape Cod near to where we go for vacation every year. We had a very enjoyable lunch with him this September and learned quite a bit more about the past of our BN1. And we swapped a variety of other sports car stories accompanied by a few glasses of local brews.

I did take the BN1 to the Woodstock, NY British Car Show in October. This was a very good show. There was near a dozen Big Healeys and Sprites among the 100 cars. Best of show went to a 1952 Alard J2 that was stunning.

We experienced the "hot and colds" of open big Healey motoring this year. On a 90 degree Sunday afternoon in late June we set out for a summer drive. We didn't recall prior six cylinder Healeys being that HOT! And I made sure the fresh air vent was working. Good news is the engine never showed signs of overheating and stayed around 180 degrees. I have since installed DynaMat insulation under the carpets. The other extreme was this past Saturday which had a high temperature in the low 50s. We drove the BN1 to visit a local Healey friend who lives about an hour to the North East. Although our return leg of the trip was in mid-afternoon, the chilly air from the setting sun made we wish the BN1's heater was not sitting on a shelf in the garage. Brrrr! Is all I can say.

That wraps up 'Our BN1 - Year One' I have fully enjoyed rekindling my Healey spirit after a 33 year hibernation. I wonder how that happened? Perhaps because I also have a 1964 TR4 and 1970 TVR Vixen. Each has its own special character that it shares with you. But the Healey Hundred has captivated me with that unique vintage feeling different than the others. And...it is a Healey.

Aside from the inherent Healey charm and spirit I found I was drawn into the personality of this BN1 beyond any of the other 15 sports cars I have owned, Austin Healeys and otherwise. I have become acquainted with three prior owners and how they contributed to what it is now. A man in Connecticut did a frame on restoration only to discover he was too big to drive it comfortably and, therefore, only put 900 miles on it from 1975 thru 1998. The next owner took it home to Cape Cod, enjoyed a brief period of vintage racing and toured around the Cape on summers for the next eleven years. The lady I bought it from only owned it for seven months, had high anticipations to expand her portfolio of life's adventures only to have other challenges force its sale prematurely. Now it's my turn to write another chapter in this BN1s saga. As I have crawled under, in, over this old car and driven it many times I feel an association with these people and how each contributed to its patina and stories it could tell. How did the windshield get a sticker from the Pacific Centre AHC? Was it originally a west coast car? Numerous people have suggested this would be a great car for a thorough restoration. For now, I can't bring myself to erase the legacy of its past and the opportunity to build on that.

So...."Year One With BN1" was a very good year.



#### 2011 Year End AHCA New England On-Line Survey Results

All those members who participated in the on-line survey thank you for your insight recommendations. This is this third survey, which we have conducted over the past year plus. The purpose of the survey is to gauge the interest of the members in past events and to shape the direction of the club for 2012 and beyond. The fall 2011 survey used a couple of follow up questions from 2010 and spring 2011. This way we can compare the direction of the club compared to the past. We had several new questions to evaluate the 10 one day and 5 multi day AHCA NE and multi marque British car events. Finally, we had a new question to determine the member's satisfaction with your club, and its future direction.

- 1. How long have you been an AHCA NE Club member?
- 2. How many AHCA NE Events did you attend in 2011?
- 3. How would you rate this year's quality of each of the one day events from (Excellent) to (Just OK), or did not attend because of (Weather), (Distance), (Conflict), or (No interest)?
- 4. How would you rate this year's multi day British Car events from (Excellent) to (Just OK), or did not attend because of (Price), (Distance), (Conflict) or (No interest)?
- 5. What would you like see more in the club during 2012?
- 6. What distance in miles are you willing to drive your Healey to attend local one day events?
- 7. How would you rate your current experience of the New England Austin Healey club?
- 8. Summit 2012 will be held at the Eagle Mountain Resort Jackson, NH, Wednesday July 11th Sunday July 15th and I plan to attend.
- 9. I would like to help in the planning of Summit 2012 and will contact Bob Britton healeybj7@hotmail.com or 603 381 3158.

The results of the survey revealed a positive trend in terms of Participation, Quality of events, overall Satisfaction of being a member of AHCA NE, and the value. Almost 50 percent of our members have belonged for over 16 years, but the fastest growing segments are members from 1 to 15 years, with a 15% growth in these two categories.

Members participation in 2011 events improved over 30% from last year with approximately 2/3's of the members participating in at least one of the fifteen events. Over a third of the membership attended 2 or more events in 2011, with 2 percent attending 5 or more. Conflict and Distance were the largest reasons why members did not attend events. Our membership loves to drive our Healey's as 95% are willing to drive over 25 miles to attend and one day event. AHCA NE is the largest region in terms of membership and geography. During 2011, we sponsored or participated in events in each of the seven state territories which AHCA NE covers, which is a strong tribute to our member's contributions.

Summit, Sun and Sand, was the best attended event in 2011, followed by the Christmas Party, British Invasion, and British Car day at Lars Anderson Museum of Transportation. Approximately, 50% of the respondents attended Summit 2011 with a strong satisfaction rating over 93%. British Invasion had a 100% satisfactory rating followed closely by the Christmas Party at greater than 93%.

I want to personal thank and recognize Bill Erickson, Jim Smith, Rich Ray, and Jack Miller for organizing and hosting very interesting and enjoyable one day events. Conflicts, Distance, or Weather are the biggest challenges to one day events. The other areas which interest our members the most are; Touring and Driving events, more Fall events, e-mail reminders of upcoming events, museum or car collections, and tech sessions.

As it relates to members interest for 2012, regional one day events, has the greatest interest. Don't let other members have all the fun of hosting a one day event in 2012. Please let me or any of the club officers know of your interesting in hosting an event and proposed date which we can lock into the 2012 Event Calendar. Our first planning meeting for 2012 is the middle of January so let us know your ideas.

Summit 2012 is going to be held at the Eagle Mountain resort in Jackson, NH July 11<sup>th</sup> – 15<sup>th</sup>. This is the 15<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of rotating venue, Summits and the only New England premier Healey event, for two years. 84% of the respondents said they may, or will be attending Summit 2012, chaired by Bob Britton. Of that group 50%, said they are willing to contribute or help with the planning and execution of Summit 2012. Thank you to everyone who has already agreed to support Bob with Summit.

Our members approve of the New England Austin Healey club, with 90% rating the club as Meets or Exceeds their expectations. We want to hear from the 10 percent of members, which gave no response or believe the club needs to improve in the future. On a rating scale of 0 to 4, the average score was 2.9.

Drilling down deeper into the responses revealed, generally the longer the membership in AHCA NE, the more events attended and the better satisfaction. The newer members are the ones who scored their satisfaction with the club lower and attended fewer events. I suggest participation increases the enjoyment and satisfaction with AHCA NE.
