September 14th, rain day 15th



AHCA Tour of "Back Country" Greenwich, CT - Rudi Markl, Rye, NY We lucked out! Sunday, June 9, was a fine, sunny day sandwiched between days of rain. Some roads were flooded when I scouted the day before the tour and it rained more the day after.

Though they came the longest distance, the McMahons were the first to join us at the Green in charming Bedford, NY. Soon there were six big Healeys and a Bugeye (plus a fine factory 100M that couldn't do the tour). The three-hour, 37-mile tour went off without a hitch. (Okay, we did have to wait for a few cars that missed the first turn.) We stopped to stretch at two nature preserves and enjoyed our picnics on the grounds of the Greenwich Audubon Center, which features a gallery full of bird prints (and, more importantly, the only bathrooms on the route).

Those unfamiliar with the area were amazed that such a gorgeous, peaceful area of hilly, winding roads sprinkled with historical houses, barns, horse farms, meadows, rock walls, ruins of mills, and ponds exists so near I-95.

I joined our area club in 1975, but later moved away. This is the first AHCA event I've hosted since returning to New York 9 years ago. I decided to do it because there have been NO club events near New York City, despite the large number of members here. If some of you southwestern Connecticut and New York members would consider running a simple tour like this on YOUR favorite roads there'd be a whole lot of (scuttle) shakin' going on down here!

SU CARB DASHPOT OIL Tech tip

One of the routine maintenance items that is often ignored or forgotten is the oil in the SU dampers. The purpose of the damper is to retard upward movement of the piston on the rapid throttle opening associated with acceleration. This delay in the piston movement causes a momentary decrease in pressure at the throat, thus achieving a momentary increase in the richness much the same as with an accelerator pump on other types of carburetors. The weight of the oil in the damper determines the amount of dampening. There is a widespread difference of opinion about what is the best weight oil to use. Many use ordinary engine oil, others use a light weight oil such as Marvel Mystery Oil. SU publications recommend 20 weight oil which I use now after trying both engine oil and MMO and I have found it to be very satisfactory. The best thing is you can buy a small amount of 20 weight oil right at your local hardware store, it is called "3 in 1 Oil" and it will cost a lot less than the special SU Dashpot oil sold by Moss and other vendors. And, don't forget, you only want to fill the piston rod with oil to within a ½"-5/8" of the top or otherwise oil will spill into the suction chamber. Submitted by Bob Britton

Hi everyone,

I am fairly new to the Austin Healey club of New England. I am doing a ground up restoration of a 1956 BN2 100 Healey. Peter Sturtevant and I spoke a few months ago about writing in the newsletter about my experiences in doing this sometimes daunting task. I am one year into this project now and I am more confident about competing a bucket list item of mine in the way I envisioned it from the start.

Each month I will work on another installment to the newsletter describing the progress made as well as my thoughts on what I am doing and why. This article is primarily for the person who might decide to tackle the project with his/her own hands and have others do work that they might not be comfortable with.

Here are some of the basics of must haves.

- 1) Willingness of being filthy after working more than five minutes at a time.
- 2) The temperament of understanding that your car does not have an attitude to defeat you. It is neutral in this. Keep repeating this when it takes a day to remove a stuck bronze shackle bushing!
- 3) If you grew up loving "all things mechanical" and working all day on the car feels like only five minutes.
 - 4) Having an understanding wife If you are married.
- 5) Having an understanding of tools be it power or hand operated. Being able to weld at a decent level or perhaps take a welding course before you attempt it.
- 6) Full understanding of safety and an absolute willingness to not take chances ever. This includes eye, hearing and proper use of air filtration that you breath, be it grinding dust or chemicals when spraying.
- 7) A decent work place to transform your dream car. I would say that a larger two car is minimum. If there is an attic it is a great plus for the lighter parts that needs to be kept clean.
 - 8) A good air compressor with dryer for use with air tools and later for spray equipment.
- 9) A lot of time on your hands. Being retired certainly helps. Do not have a time schedule. Good restorations take as long as it takes.
 - 10) Get restoration guides and all related manuals and read them more than once!
- 11) A digital camera and computer to store progress and procedures you are going through. It will help on reassembly.
 - 12) Auto rotisserie to get to all areas of car easily.
 - 13) Ability to do research for parts etc.

If you are comfortable with all of the above, restoring a car can be a blast. It will be a great sense of accomplishment knowing that you did it.

Next month- Finding a car and bringing the "baby" home.
