SUMMIT 2014 - Plymouth, MA: "Treasure By The Sea"

After 2 months of perfect weather, with nary a raincloud in sight, the gathering of British Iron in the wee community of Plymouth, Massachusetts seemed to magnetize the foul weather clouds into a holding pattern just off the eastern shore. Spinning in place for four days, this weather system with; on shore wind gusts up to 50 mph, driving rain, periodic downpours, raw, chilling, and damp days did not dissuade the "faithful" from their appointed rounds for SUMMIT 2014.

After reading this first paragraph, many of you are thinking, "Thank goodness, with all that bad weather, we didn't go!" But you would be wrong! Despite all of the precipitous conditions spilled upon our small community, there were enough "dry" moments, fun events, special gatherings and great food to wash all of those problems away!

Over 40 cars and 80 members participated in a great five day event that included a soggy treasure hunt in downtown Plymouth, where the majority of participants "holed-up" in one of several warm, cozy eating and drinking emporiums. With no one actually finishing the rally, the rambling through Town Brook Park, up Leyden Street (the oldest street in North America) and along Main and Court Streets produced several qualifiers who met with the Crimson Pirate to select their "pirate booty" and with the Quartermaster, to find out what it was worth! Those who enthusiastically participated learned quite a bit about America's Hometown and, when all was said and done, everyone claims to have had a really good time. "Me thinks it be perhaps the fact they did not have to drive their cars any distance this day!"

By late Thursday afternoon, most all of the participants had arrived. Just before leaving for dinner on the Town Wharf ,there was an informational meeting with Jack Angley, local cranberry grower. Preparing our drivers for the forthcoming "Cranberry Rally", Jack carefully guided our mesmerized members through the life and times of the what the local growers endure. With cranberry harvesting season in full swing, there was a great deal of interest in what we would see and experience on the rally and our visit to Flax Pond Farms, for a demonstration of an original bounce- board cranberry separator, inspection of harvesting machines and a trip through a gift shop loaded with unique, local cranberry products.

At 5:15PM sharp, the weather allowed for a Healey parade through downtown Plymouth to our dinner destination of Woods Seafood Restaurant on the Town Wharf. It has become very obvious to me that to have a successful meet, you need to have great food and so it was with this gathering. One would think that the diners hadn't eaten in a week! There were piles and piles of fried haddock, scallop and shrimp plates, clam boats as well as the "Fisherman's Platters" which were piled high with all of the above plus mounds of french fries and cole slaw! This is not to mentioned the gallons of clam chowder, hungrily devoured by our crew, especially those from "La Belle Province". Fully sated, the crowd returned to the hotel for a wonderful evening of "Hospitality" in the function room of the Pilgrim Sands. (continued page 5)

On Friday morning, the day was to begin with "Breakfast On The Deck". But, with a gusting on-shore wind of about 40 mph, chasing after sausages, bacon strips and bagels was not how we wanted to spend the morning, so the event was moved inside. The first participants of the Cranberry Rally left the parking lot under cloudy, but rainless skies. The 37 mile rally began with a short leg from Plymouth to the epicenter of cranberry production in the neighboring town of Carver. The first check point was a stop at Flax Pond Farms, operated by Jack and Dot Angley. It was certainly an eye-opening experience for members to see what actually has to take place for that can of cranberry sauce to arrive at the Thanksgiving Day table! Not an easy life!

After a 10 mile run through the small, quiet back roads of Carver, lined with cranberry bog after cranberry bog, and answering questions, in part devised by our 7 year old grand daughter, the cars made a second stop on the grounds of Edaville Railroad, a well-known attraction tourist spot for over fifty years. Edaville is actually a narrow gauge steam railroad built in the 1940's by Ellis D. Atwood (EDA) to transport his cranberry harvest from the bogs to the main roads. He would open this popular attraction following the cranberry harvest, adding various static Christmas displays and colorful lights to the bogs, which have been viewed by hundreds of thousands young eyes, completely spellbound by the entire adventure.

One of the most popular check points on the Cranberry Rally was at the headquarters of Factory Five Racing, in Wareham, MA. Factory Five has gained a tremendous reputation for their Cobra-style kit cars. Groups were organized for a factory tour that amazed even the most ardent enthusiast. When you actually get to see and experience what goes into their productions, you can't help but appreciate the finished product. Seems a few folks may have added something to their Christmas wish-list!

After a quick ride into Bourne, the Healeys enjoyed a short but thrilling ride over our version of the "tail of the dragon" before coming to the Cape Cod Canal. Some last minute construction complicated the trip over the Sagamore Bridge onto Cape Cod, but any misgivings were immediately dispelled by the fine food served at the Sagamore Inn, a Cape institution for almost sixty years! Once again, if it came from the sea, it was consumed in great quantity with many happy smiles were seen on the faces of those completing the rally and enjoying the fresh seafood.

After an afternoon to pursue their own interests, attendees gathered for a Pizza Night celebration in the function room of the Pilgrim Sands. It is indeed a rare sight to have "leftover food" at any Healey event, but such was the case as the pizza was devoured - only to have have a few large cheese pizzas leftover - which eventually found their way to the wonderful and most accommodating staff of the hotel.

It may have rained once again during the night, but on the morning of the car show, as folks were drying off their cars, occasional rays of sun poked out of the clouds. This gave everyone a renewed confidence that the car show would not have any issues (continued page 6)

Billed as a true popular-vote car show, Healey owners were not disappointed as tourists, there to see the attractions, were only too eager to check out the goings on just a few paces away from "The Rock". It was also enjoyed by the many "locals" out for a jog, pushing a carriage, walking the dog and just driving by. 250 ballots had been prepared for the popular vote and before the show was over, all had been used. The rain held off, the folks came out and the car show was a great success!

The afternoon was completed when the competing of the valve cover racers took place on the back deck of the Pilgrim Sands Motel. Eight participants were weighed in, scrutineered and lined up for the dash down the newly renovated VCR track! Thanks to Jim Begin, a much smoother transition had been conceived and employed for this years run! This also proved to be a popular event for the on-lookers, who not only lined the course, but also the second floor balcony's to cheer on their favorite entry. While the results may have appeared to be a foregone conclusion, it seems that recent modifications to one contender's entry upset the oddsmakers predictions!

The Awards Banquet was a fitting end to the "Treasure By The Sea" Summit. Over 60 members gathered for more great food (no seafood this time - as I believe local stocks had already been completely depleted by our club), great libations, and a fun evening celebrating the various winners of the many SUMMIT events. Following the meal and awards there were a few auction items to be dispensed with, including TWO trips to the F1 races in Montreal, a great "package" enhancer to ENCLAVE 2015 and the "Sea Chest" that was the focal point of the Treasure Hunt and the display in the lobby.




