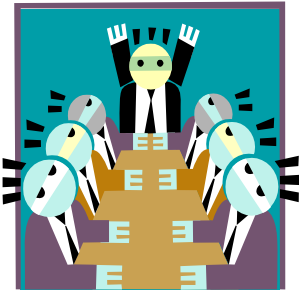

Making Sense Out of Those Sidewall Hieroglyphics

It's dark.

It's raining.

As you speed down the freeway, suddenly there's the terrifying sound of a blowout.

Reacting quickly, you manage to keep the car under control and ease off to the side of the road.

Then you remember you don't have a spare.

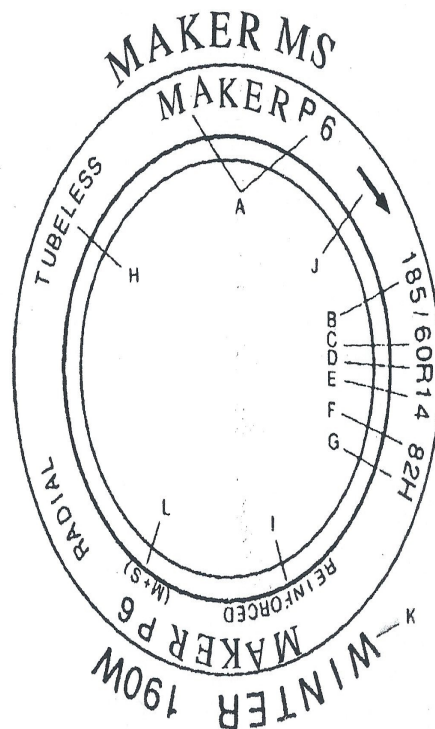
As luck has it, a passing motorist with a car phone stops to help. "I'll call an all-night garage I know about that's up ahead a few miles," the motorist says. "Just tell me what kind of tire you need."

Now comes the real challenge of the evening — making sense, in the dark, in the rain, out of the well-worn hieroglyphics embossed on the sidewall of the tire. Does the garage need all of this information, or just some of it? And just what the heck do all these numbers and letters mean, anyway?

No problem, you've of course clipped out the handy little chart below and placed it in your owner's manual in the glove compartment. You quickly brush up on the terminology, informed your motorist/savior that you need a 185/60R14 or some such, and he relays the info to the garage.

Soon you're back on the road, with a little help from your friends.

- A. Manufacturer and product names
- B. Nominal section width in millimeters
- C. Aspect ratio for series lower than 80. (Ratio between sidewall height, H, and section width, S.)
- D. Indicates radial construction (B if biased, no marking if bias ply.)
- E. Rim diameter in inches
- F. Index indicating maximum speed
- G. Speed code indicating maximum speed
- H. Indicates a tire designed to be used without a tube, tires that require tubes are marked "TUBE TYPE"
- I. Indicates reinforced internal structure to support greater-than-normal loads. Do not replace a reinforced tire with one that is not designed for these larger loads
- J. Arrow indicating the correct direction of rotation, this marking appears only on tires with a directional tread pattern
- K. For winter tires only: Manufacturer and product names
- L. Indicates a tread pattern designed for "mud and snow" use. In many states this marking must appear for the tire to legally qualify as a snow tire





1955-'56 Austin-Healey 100M

Rarity and racing heritage give the factory-built 100M a purposeful and pricey pedigree

The rare, race-ready four-cylinder variants of the “Big” Austin-Healey have long been considered some of the most desirable British sports cars. There is a lot of misunderstanding surrounding the epic 100M, so we’ve turned to Reid Trummel, historian and editor of the Austin-Healey Club of America’s publication, *Healey Marque*, for clarification.

Reid tells us that the factory-built 100Ms were constructed between September 5, 1955, and July 16, 1956, and those cars are the only ones that can properly be called “100M.” The confusion about this model comes from a similar “Le Mans Engine Modification Kit” that the Donald Healey Motor Company offered for first and second series (BN1 and BN2 in Healey-speak) regular-production 100 models. This kit contained after-market performance equipment

and accessories and could be fitted to cars by private owners, by dealers, or even at the Healey works, and there are no records of how many cars had the kits (complete or partial) installed, then or now.

The Le Mans Kit included some of the items that would be factory-fitted to genuine 100Ms, but the real deal got goodies like 8.1:1 high-compression pistons, 1½-inch SU H6 carburetors on an aluminum intake manifold, a carburetor cold air box and a high-lift camshaft. Its suspension received a larger front anti-roll bar and unique front shocks, while the body was distinguished with a louvered bonnet, leather bonnet strap and, in most cases, two-tone paint. The 100M made a genuine 110 hp, 20 more than the standard 100 and eight more than cars fitted with the Le Mans Kit.

“Of the 4,604 BN2 series 100

models made, the records show that 640 were converted to 100M models. That’s 14 percent of production, making them perhaps not all that extremely rare, at least proportionally,” he says. “It’s not like the mere 50 (55 if you count prototypes) 100S models made.”

Reid continues, “Many people believe that cars with the Le Mans Kit installed are the same spec as a 100M, but that’s incorrect. Additionally, even if installing a kit did result in a car of identical spec, it would be only a ‘tribute’ or ‘clone’ of a 100M.” Sadly, it’s not unusual to find unscrupulous sellers who have promoted standard cars, with a few Le Mans Kit pieces installed, as genuine 100Ms, even going so far as to use genuine 100M chassis numbers. “Fortunately, there is help available via Bill Meade’s excellent Worldwide 100M Le Mans



Registry (www.100mregistry.com/index.html), including his identification guide,” he says. “While not foolproof, the guide will assist anyone to identify all but the most elaborate fakes. Of the 640 100M models made, the 100M Registry has almost 200 accounted for.”

Genuine 100Ms have been steadily increasing in value, and some predict this model will crack the \$300,000 mark. “As a longtime Healey guy, it doesn’t seem possible, although I can remember when \$100,000 for a 100S seemed ridiculous,” Reid muses. “I wouldn’t recommend buying a 100M with the expectation that they will double in value, but the potential downside is likely small, and in the meantime, you’ll own a limited-production quintessential British sports car with an interesting history.”

Home Mechanic's Guide to Tools and Their Uses :

SKILL SAW :

A portable cutting tool used to make boards too short.

CHANNEL LOCKS :

Used to round off bolt heads. Sometimes used in the creation of blood-blisters.

DRILL PRESS :

A tall upright machine useful for suddenly snatching flat metal bar stock out of your hands so that it smacks you in the chest and flings your beer across the room, denting the freshly-painted Healey part which you had carefully set in the corner where nothing could get to it.

PHILLIPS SCREWDRIVER :

Normally used to stab the vacuum seals under lids of for opening old-style paper-and-tin oil cans and splashing oil on your shirt; but can also be used, as the name implies, to strip out Phillips screw heads.

STRAIGHT SCREWDRIVER :

A tool for opening paint cans. Sometimes used to convert common slotted screws into non-removable screws and butchering your palms.

HAMMER :

Originally employed as a weapon of war, the hammer nowadays is used as a kind of divining rod to locate the most expensive part adjacent to the object you are trying to hit. Also very effective at fingernail removal.

OXYACETYLENE TORCH :

Used almost entirely for igniting various flammable objects in your shop and creating a fire. Also handy for igniting the grease inside the wheel hub out of which you want to remove a bearing race.

TABLE SAW :

A large stationary power tool commonly used to launch wood projectiles for testing wall integrity. Very effective for digit removal !

UTILITY KNIFE :

Used to open and slice through the contents of cardboard cartons delivered to your front door from your favorite British Car Parts supplier. Works particularly well on contents such as seats, vinyl records, liquids in plastic bottles, back issues of *Healey Marque* containing the informative article on your particular car project, seals and rubber or plastic parts. Especially useful for slicing work clothes, but only while in use. These can also be used to initiate a trip to the emergency room so a doctor can sew up the damage.

PVS PIPE CUTTER :

A tool used to make plastic pipe too short.

BELT SANDER :

An electric sanding tool commonly used to convert minor touch-up jobs into major refinishing jobs.

WIRE WHEEL :

Cleans paint off bolts and then throws them somewhere under the workbench with the speed of light. Also removes fingerprints and hard-earned calluses from fingers in about the time it takes you to say "Oh, S**T" ...

VICE-GRIPS :

Generally used after pliers to completely round off bolt heads. If nothing else is available, they can also be used to transfer intense welding heat to the palm of your hand.

HYDRAULIC FLOOR JACK :

Used for lowering your Healey to the ground after you have installed your new brake shoes, trapping the jack handle firmly under the bumper.

HACKSAW :

One of a family of cutting tools built on the Ouija board principle. It transforms human energy into a crooked, unpredictable motion, and the more you attempt to influence its course, the more dismal your future becomes.

BAND SAW :

A large stationary power saw primarily used by most shops to cut large pieces into smaller pieces that more easily fit into the trash after you cut on the inside of the dotted line instead of the outside edge. Also excels at amputations.
